II. UPDATE - Regional Plan for Sustainable Development

- A. Sarah Lucas (NWMCOG)
 - a. The Grand Action plan will be a living document that communities can use for local decisionmaking. It will include plans for Housing, Transportation, Land Use, and Energy. The plan will be developed through citizen input. The Grand Vision networks and the core partners will convene public work sessions in each of the six counties. The plan will be completed by summer of 2014.

III. Regional Food Systems

- A. Susan Cocciarelli / Rob Sirrine (MSUE/NWMCOG)
 - a. Regional food economy is a foundational area of growth. There is a much greater demand than supply for fresh/local food and much more awareness of the nutritional value along with the source of the food. Farms are getting smaller in size, but more in number, need to form a regional cooperative. Diverse value added produce present more opportunities for farmers due to the significant supply and demand for diverse agriculture in the region.
- B. Sarah Lucas Food Innovation Districts (NWMCOG)
 - These are a geographic concentration of food-oriented businesses, services, and community activities which local governments support through planning and economic development initiatives. There are 3 types of district activity including producer-oriented, community oriented, and place oriented. There are multiple types of activity within each of these district activities. Champions and Plans of food innovation districts should focus on assessments, Initiating project, and implementing.

- G. Village of Kalkaska The Village with the assistance of a Community Growth Grant is in the process acquiring an entire city block for the purpose of redevelopment.
